Sing Lit Station LTD (SLS) is a non-profit literary arts organization, registered charity and Institution of Public Character (IPC). Through our various programmes and initiatives, we want to be a platform where readers and writers can meet.

CORE PROGRAMMES

• Poetry.sg

Our core programme, poetry.sg, continues to grow as it enters its third year of operations. A user-friendly and online-accessible archive of Singaporean poets that also functions as a critical and educational resource, poetry.sg has decided to expand into one of the other non-English Official Languages of Singapore – specifically, Malay. With the assistance of Annaliza Bakri as the main editor of the Malay arm, archiving, translating and creating multimedia content from a select list of Malay poets has proven to be a challenging but ultimately rewarding enterprise for the poetry.sg team, culminating in an excellent showcase at the Singapore Writers Festival. To date, we have had 6,000 unique visitors to the site.

• Manuscript Bootcamp (Poetry)

Our other core programme, Manuscript Bootcamp, also did much to serve the future poets of Singapore. After receiving a highly competitive number of 50 manuscripts, an international panel of senior poets was put together to whittle our shortlist of 12 manuscripts down to a final selection of 6 participants. An entire weekend of curated talks and panels were then arranged to put our participants through their paces in what we felt was a bigger, more legitimate and industry-strengthening edition of the Bootcamp.

• Singapore Poetry Writing Month (SingPoWriMo)

In April we ran our fourth iteration of Singapore Poetry Writing Month (SingPoWriMo) with up to **5,000 members** on our Facebook group, facilitated by an experienced team of senior and junior moderators. We raised more than **USD 4,000** on our Indiegogo campaign to fund the publication of our fourth anthology, which had a well-attended launch at the Singapore Writers Festival later in the year. We believe, now more than ever, that SingPoWriMo remains the key highlight in our literary calendar, allowing us to provide active participation from wannabe



writers, identifying emerging talent, and allowing seasoned and established writers a platform to be seen and paid attention to be thousands.

• Book a Writer (BAW) / Camp Lit

This year, we launched Book A Writer, our workshop-for-schools programme that gives various schools and institutions the exciting option to commission some of our most important writers at work today to conduct workshops and talks to their students. The growing popularity of our programme has made Sing Lit Station confident in its ability to provide affiliated writers with a measure of income, to increase their exposure to young students, and to develop their capabilities in teaching and communicating their valuable skills and knowledge in the literary arts. It has also pushed us to devise a twice-yearly "camp" for students: named Camp Lit, it invites students to sign up for an entire package of writing, literary-based and multi-disciplinary workshops devised by a commissioned panel of writers.

To date, we have held 69 workshops and talks reaching 2781 students.

• Hawker Prize for Southeast Asian Poetry

We have also launched The Hawker Prize for Southeast Asian Poetry. The initiative allows us to make good use of the generous funds we've managed to raise as a charity and IPC throughout the second Financial Year. It has also afforded us the splendid opportunity to broaden our scope towards a region (namely, Southeast Asia) that Sing Lit Station is invested in engaging with meaningfully. It also enables us to highlight the efforts of editors, publishers and translators from or based in the region — those who tirelessly run an entire range of literary journals and publications that help to kickstart or promote the careers of aspiring, emerging and established writers. The inaugural edition of the Hawker Prize has done much in engaging both editors and readers from around the world, and we can only hope that the Prize continues to grow in prestige in the coming years.

SUPPLEMENTARY PROGRAMMES

This year was also a landmark year for our organisation, in which we embarked on three separate projects in collaboration with three separate organisations, which had three very different target audiences while also stretching our organisational capabilities in ways both challenging and invaluable.

Literary Collaborations

• Sing Lit Body Slam

October 2017: The first project, conceptualised and presented with Grapple Max Dojo, was Sing Lit Body Slam, supported by the Arts Fund and held at the MPH of Aliwal Arts Centre. As our first ever fundraising event as a charity and IPC, Sing Lit Station was also fully aware that the event would push at the limits of what constituted spoken word in a world-first collaboration between performance poetry and pro-wrestling. But we were glad to say that the event was a success and a hit with our audience members, who found it both invigorating and entertaining. We sold **196 tickets**, resulting in a sold-out first night.

• LAF-SLS Translation Retreat



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October – November 2017: With the aim of better increasing the ability of multilingual poets to translate poems across cultures and languages, 3 poets from Europe and 3 poets from Singapore (accompanied by guests Pierre Vinclair and Afi Noor) were housed in Iskandar, Malaysia over a period of 4 days. The project then culminated with a presentation of new work at the Singapore Writers Festival.

• Out-of-Print Exhibition

February – March 2018: The third project, presented by Sing Lit Station, curated by Daryl Lim Wei Jie and art directed by Sarah and Schooling, was Out of Print, supported by the 2018 #BuySingLit campaign and held at Gallery I of the The Arts House. A programme of the #BuySingLit weekend, The Arts House's Textures weekend and the 2018 Singapore Design Week, it was also covered by Arts Equator by Corrie Tan. The exhibition, showcasing the power of graphic design and the history of Singaporean literature, was also supplemented with 6 tours (including 1 foreign media tour for SDW, organised by the Singapore Tourism Board). There were 60 – 90 participants in total.

Writers' Centre

• Workshop Centre

Sing Lit Station has also committed itself to being a platform where various workshop groups might gather with the aim of creating a sense of community while also improving one another's practices in fiction or poetry. Writing the City, the monthly meet-up series first organised by the British Council, remains steady and well-organised under Jon Gresham. We also play host to monthly meetings by the Image-Symbol Department, [insert cool name here] and the atom collective, as well as our monthly community-based meetings with migrant worker writers (culminating in a mini-festival at our office) and queer folk (later named Club Penguin).

Writing Residency

In yet another show of unwavering commitment to making Sing Lit Station a writers' centre, we are proud to say that we awarded non-fiction writer Chan Li Shan and the prolific poet / translator / philosopher Pierre Vinclair the Jalan Kubor Writing Residency, in which they have full access to our space and the free use of a desk each. To commemorate their time with Sing Lit Station, Li Shan gave a reading of works-in-progress while Pierre will be giving an upcoming lecture on the development of contemporary French poetry. Pierre will also be extending his residency at Sing Lit Station by an additional 4 months.
